




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FOUNTAIN CENTRE IN DANGER!

Lolden Disc Seen Low Over Elm Hill

The quantity of sightings of UFO's seen over Warminster since production of the No.2 edition of this Journal precludes listing however I would like to detail some of the more dramatic incidents.

The night of 30th June 1976 was perticularly rewarding Present at Cradle Hill were Fred Hatcher aviation designer for BAC, Author Arthur Shuttlewood, Barry Musselwhite, Sheila Meredith, Penny Stern, Peter and Jane Paget and Sheila and Helen The evening was clear, no wind, the time 9.30pm. Fred had suggested that as there were nine people present, and Arthur added that it was the 30th of the sixth month, which adds to nine, we should try to send out thoughts out quietly and ask for some visual indication of the existance of Flying Saucers. It sounded a bit unlikely, but as we were all prepared to give it a go we stood facing North and tried the telepathy routine.

As we waited over the next hour the conversation ran over other sightings and pet theories. Arthur and Jane on top form with their continous flow of puns and jokes kept everyone amused and it was quite by surrrise that around

10.30pm someone shouted, "Whats that!". Could it be that our experiment had worked, for gliding in from the North at an altitude no higher than 8000ft (Fred estimated) was a circular craft carrying clearly seen lights. Its speed was quite slow, (estimated 200/250 knots) and it undulated slightly in its flight path. No flashing anti-collision lights could be detected but through IO X 50 glasses five white lights could be seen arranged in a square on the underside the fifth being in the centre. Also a red light shead and below the central light. All lights were pin point and constant. Having myself seen may military aircraft over Salisbury Plain, I was certain it was not of ".) origin.

Its body was metal grey visable in the fading light. No sound could be heard and as it flew over the copse at Cradle Hill, some quarter mile away, and banked to the West it clearly had no wings but was just a body in flight. No windows could be observed and no exhaust. A very faint sound like that of a turbine was detected by some watchers, not others, but it in no way sounded like a jet or a turbo-prop engine.

Later in the evening we returned to Star House and sat chatting in the paddock under a star spangled sky. The occasional satellite passed over. Then without warning from a part of the heavens where no other object could be seen several bright pin point flashes blinked. They were very bright and of a high colour temperature, towards 5000 K. One had the impression that a directional flask gun was being used as the flashes were all of very short duration, maybe I/I000 sec. No aircraft noise could be heard at the time or afterwards. Whatever was making the flashes was high in the sky, but much lower than an orbital object for the beam of the light could be seen in the air for a short distance from its source which was standing still.

Barry flashed three plus three plus three dots with his powerful torch and at once the signal was returned. The quickness of the response pave the impression that the process was automatic rather than manual. I have noticed this feature before and it would seem that any short sequence is faithfully returned immediately. The flashes were definitely not lightning as they were from a roint, there was no cloud anyway. The chances of them being eteors also was dismissed as they all occured at the same roint. High flying aircraft don't stand still, so that was out too.

Fred Laving retired to the top of Star House observed the lowest of the UFO's of that week. While laying on his bed overlooking Elm Hill he saw a golden disc glide in from the West and dip towards the Colf Course, then depart Eastward. The time was 4sm and the same thing happened a ain about 4. IOam but this time going East to West.

Many people come to Warminster and see only 'satellites' However if these objects do not stop, change direction, or signal one cannot say if they are man made or not. The only paint I would like to take is that many of these lights that travel
