WINCHESTER LANDING - CONFIRMATION ?

Readers will remember that we were the first magazine to print the encounter case of Mrs Joyce Bowles and Mr Ted Pratin our No.6, Christmas Edition. In No.7, under title of "UK FLAP" we detailed the contact case of Mrs J and Mr T. As this has now appeared on television we can confirm that the two persons concerned are the same. Mrs Bowles having phoned Fountain Centre half an hour after the contact in which they met the "visitors".

Two letters have now arrived which tend to confirm this

event, and these are printed below:

Dear Sir,

I live in Southampton. Just a short time ago, some people reported a UFO on the Winchester bypass. On the same night I was travelling home from my girlfriends house. I saw what I would swear on any oath to be a UFO. It was IIpm, and I was about 3 miles from the bypass, on a hill.

I have seen reflections from other car lights on mist or fog, or even on the clouds. Eastleigh has an airport, so I know a plane with its flashing red & green lights, and also its white headlights. What I saw was none of these. I'm not a drinker either.

Coming across from the bypass area - an orange red light at about IOOft high, not flashing but glowing like a main street light, hard to focus on. It was round sort of loaf shaped. So silent, because I slowed down in my car and coasted to see if I could hear any noise. It came towards me went over my car and disappeared in the Petersfield direction over the wooded area. Back in January I went and investigated the sight of the reported landing of a space craft at Chilcombe, at the end of the Winchester By-Pass,.. I spent about two hours there on the Wens, morning and after a while found a few faint foot prints leading from the field where the craft landed to the point where the car went up on the grass. They were about our size with plain soles, but each one was about 6" or so longer in the stride that our average stride. If they were 'his' then he must have been quite tall with a long stride. If you were introduced to a UFO spotter, you might well feel inclined to start the conversation with references to little green men saying: "Take me to your leader." But conversational gambits like that don't go down well in Warminster, Wiltshire.

Apparently UFOs round Warminster are as common as jumb jets at Heathrow. In the 1960s, especially, aliens in their flying machines seemed to take an extra interest in this

part of the country.
People told of being wakened at night by loud rattling sounds on their roofs. Others claimed they were pinned, paralysed, to the ground by strange force fields. Motorist reported inexplicable things going wrong with their cars.

With my head full of stories of mysterious, unexplaine goings-on, you'll understand that I felt rather nervous as I set off to join a band of enthusiasts who hold a Saturday night vigil in the hills round Warminster.

Leaders of the expedition were Peter and Jane Paget, who run a UFO information centre in Warminster. Jane is 26, petite and pretty, and very interested in that other kind of star-gazing - astrology. Both she and Peter are convince that UFOs exist, and they are a mine of information about our interplanetary visitors.

Dressed for Artic conditions, I arrived at their home appropriately called Star House - at 8.30 p.m. I was the appropriately called star house - at 0.50 p.m. I was the tenth to arrive for a before-the-watch discussion. There would be safety in numbers, I hoped.

"What's the weather like?" asked Peter.

"A bit cloudy," someone replied.

.The team assembled, we trooped into a convoy of three cars - destination Cradle Hill, about a mile away up a stee muddy, narrow lane. By nine o clock we were looking out over the dark countryside, and the comforting lights of Warminst

and its army base. The urge to keep looking over my shoulder was almost irresistible.

Two enthusiastic watchers, I7-year-old gardener Terry Chivers, and his cousin, 22-year-old Bridget Chivers, were

already there.

Bridget, binoculars slung round her neck, was fiddling with a small box-like object. "It's a UFO detector," she explained to me. "When a UFO ges_overhead the magnetic field changes and a needle moves, touching this loop which sets off a buzzer." Clever stuff, but compared to the wonders of technology that UFOs and their crews must have at their fingertips, I couldn't help wonder if this comparatively simple device would be a match for the watchers from outer space.

Terry and Bridget spend most of their Saturday nights on Cradle Hill. "We've been keen on UFOs for about two years no ," said Terry. "Our best sighting was in our back garden two years ago. We saw a cigar-shaped object travelling quite low. We have also seen some red lights which we watched for

five minutes before they suddenly disappeared.

Uncanny sights are not the only disconcerting experiences UFO watchers report, Bridget remembered one night on Cradle Hill: "We heard a crackling sound coming across the fields. We couldn't see anything, but next morning some watchers went back and found the corn in the field had been flattened."

It was now IO.I5 and the sky was still clouded. Would we see anything in these conditions?"I have a feeling we will," said Ray Darrell, a tall, good-looking 32-year-old, who os managing director of an aircraft charter firm at

Woking, Surrey.

Ray is a recent convert. On his first visit to Warminster he went to Cley Hill, another favourite watching spot, and saw a moving flashing light. "We saw about 30 satellites going over and then this light. I know the difference between a satellite and a UFO, and what we saw was not a satellite or any kind of plane."

Teeth chattering ever so slightly, though from nerves or the cold I'm not prepared to say, I talked to two other watchers, Barry and Judy Gooding. They told me about a local

farmer at Chapmanslade, near Warminster in 1974.

"He saw what he thought was the moon over Cley Hill. But a yellow glowing sphere came towards him, until it was only

300 yards away, flying level with some treetops about 60 feet high.

Barry and Judy couldn't stay for the all-night vigil-they had to go back to let_the baby-sitter go home- a bit of a slap in the face for any tuned-in alien to know that human affairs come first.

I asked Peter Paget why Warminster was so popular with bilots. "Well, it looks as if routes converge here. You UFO pilots. can watch a UFO arrive then go off in another direction, like

a motorway interchange.

A sort of celestial spagnetti junction? "This area is the most aerially haunted in the country.

People come here from America, Canada, Australia to invest-igate UFOs. We set up our centre, The Fountain Centre, because we thought it was time people had a place to contact for information about sightings, where to watch, where to

But what are these spacecraft doing here? "I believe they are acting as advisers and trying to give us guidance, said Peter. "They don't want an atomic war. Man now has the. ability to change his_environment and something like an atomic war on Earth would affect other planets.

Wiltshire isn't only a mecca for UFOs. Ancient man seemed to find it just as irresistible, and built monuments like Stonehenge, the Avebury Circle, Silbury Hill and the

Westbury White Horse to prove it.

Some people think there's a connection between these and the UFOs. What we think of as ancient burial mounds may have had another purpose. They form definite patterns based on large numbers of constellations. (Editors Note: To be detailed in a new book by author, Doug Chaundy, 'Ages in Miracles'; hopefully to be published by Abacus. Peter.)

Did neolithic man have help from aliens to build these Landmarks to guide them on their way on future visits?

Many who say UFOs landed here in ancient times point to Biblical references-other worlds and angels. Could they mean outer space? Peter believes UFOs have visited earth for eon of years, and that space people are here to help, possibly

by giving telepathic guidance.

There are less comforting theories: that to the aliens we're just an experimental colony, or animals in a zoo. Or that they're waiting for us to blow ourselves up so they ca take over_the world.

Suddenly Ray pointed to a vhitish glow coming up over
